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WHAT IS OYAP?

OYAP stands for Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program. This program allows students in grade 11 and 12 to explore and learn about a specific skilled trade through the Cooperative Education Program while completing the requirements for a high school diploma. Students graduate with soft skills, a high school diploma, experience in the field, and a step further towards their skilled trade profession. Benefits: allows students to explore the skilled trades, allows students to earn graduation credits, increases awareness of workplace needs/demands, develops transferable/tangible skills, enhances networking skills, and provides a head start towards a career in the skilled trades.

WHAT IS SHSM?

SHSM stands for Specialist High Skills Major. This program offers students the opportunity to explore a specific community or sector in preparation for a post-secondary journey in one of four pathways: Apprenticeship, College, University, or Workplace. SHSM includes specified credits, sector-specific certifications, activities in a sector-partnered hands-on experience. This allows students to work with community organizations to solve a real-life workplace problem the partnered organization might be facing.

SHSMs are available in 16 sectors (many leading to rewarding careers in skilled trades): agriculture, arts and culture, aviation/aerospace, business, construction, energy, environment, food processing, forestry, health and wellness, horticulture and landscaping, hospitality and tourism, information and communications technology, justice, community safety, and emergency services. Each school offers specific opportunities for SHSM programs. Make sure to check in with your school to find out which sector is available for you.

WHAT IS APPRENTICESHIP?

Apprenticeship is a post-secondary education opportunity in the skilled trades. As an apprentice, you would take classes and learn about your trade by working within your specific industry of interest while getting paid. Programs such as OYAP help you in gaining a step ahead into your apprenticeship pathway. A typical apprenticeship takes about the same time as other post-secondary options depending on the trade and progress of the person. There are many options in Ontario within the four skilled trades sectors: Motive Power, Service, Construction, Industrial.

Making My Way - Pathways for all Students

The Making My Way umbrella incorporates; Career Exploration, Cooperative Education, Dual Credit, Explore High Skills (EHS), Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM), and the Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP) with a strong connection to experiential learning opportunities. EXPLORE YOUR PATHWAY



The Explore High Skills (EHS) program provides sector-specific learning experiences that engage and empower grade 9 and 10 students. The Explore High Skills program is a Pre-SHSM program, designed to provide sector-related activities through experiential learning, community involvement and certifications for career plans in all pathways. Current grade eight students who are entering grade 9 in September are eligible to apply for the Explore High Skills programs and these programs are open to all students in all pathways at no cost. EHS is available at select secondary schools in the Peel District School Board.

Students can discover and explore their future careers through our Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) programs. In the SHSM program, grade 11 and 12 students focus their learning on a career area of interest through programs that are Ministry-recognized and fully funded, leading to a SHSM Red Seal Diploma. These sector-specific programs, unique to each high school, enable students to earn sector-recognized certifications towards the SHSM seal diploma. No matter what pathway you wish to pursue after high school – apprenticeship training, college, university or the workplace – the SHSM program allows you to customize your secondary school education to suit your skills and interests. The Co-operative Education Program (co-op) allows students to earn credits by integrating course curriculum with learning at a work placement. Students in all pathways – apprenticeship, college, university, or the workplace can participate. Co-op programs are available in all secondary schools. They can be designed to include up to four credits per semester to a maximum of 12 co-op credits towards the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). Students are monitored and supported in their learning by the placement supervisor and co-op teachers. Students can choose co-op placements from a broad range of practical, hands-on co-op opportunities in a variety of sectors in the community that best suit their needs and interests.

EXPLORE YOUR PATHWAY



The Ontario Youth Apprenticeship program (OYAP) is a Cooperative Education experience in a skilled trade placement. Grade 11 and 12 students learn skilled trades competencies while earning High School credits. These students become OYAP Participants and can become registered apprentices with the Ministry of Labour, Training and Skills Development (MLTSD). This will start the apprenticeship process for students while in high school.

For students with experience in Grade 12 Peel offers Accelerated OYAP in 12 programs that is the industry standard level 1 training for their trade in the second semester as students are ready to graduate.

Dual Credit programs, available through all Peel secondary schools, provide grade 11 and 12 students with a unique opportunity to earn both college and non-compulsory secondary credits at the same time. College credits earned may be applied to a college program after high school. Choose from more than 50 courses at colleges such as: Centennial, George Brown, Humber, Seneca and Sheridan.

- Students receive one college + one high school credit for each course
- Opportunity for students to receive College Credits while still in high school
- College Fees, Textbooks and transportation are all FREE to students
- College credits are transferable between colleges.
- One on One support and assistance provided by Peel monitor teachers


